### **Pride Foundation Awards 72 Grants Transforming LGBTQ Communities across the Northwest** *Awards \$383,000 to organizations in Alaska, Idaho, Montana, Oregon, & Washington*

**SEATTLE, WA**— Today, Pride Foundation announced \$383,000 in grant awards to 72 organizations in Alaska, Idaho, Montana, Oregon, and Washington—investing critical resources in leaders and communities so even more lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and queer (LGBTQ) people can be who they are, where they are.

This year's funding to organizations across the Northwest is the highest award amount in Pride Foundation history.

These remarkable grantees are working to address complex issues facing our community. Here's a snapshot of the grantees that are helping transform the lives of LGBTQ people and communities across the region:

- **Alaska Family Medicine Residency** (*Anchorage, Alaska*): For developing an LGBTQ health curriculum to be included in the medical training of family medicine resident physicians.
- **Safe Passage** (*Coeur d'Alene, Idaho*): For designing and implementing a youth-based program for LGBTQ teens and young adults—in collaboration with North Idaho Pride Alliance—with a focus on social events, a leadership summit, and educational activities.
- **Sankofa Collective Northwest** (*Portland, Oregon*): For promoting the health and well-being of black LGBTQ people and their families and friends through supportive services, education, organizing, and advocacy.
- **Yellowstone AIDS Project** (*Billings, Montana*): For providing client care and community-based education and prevention services in Eastern Montana, where 30% of Montana's population of people living with HIV currently reside.
- **U.T.O.P.I.A.** (*Seattle, Washington*): For organizing safe spaces, including programming and support groups, for LGBTQI Pacific Islander individuals living in South King County.

"We've prioritized funding organizations and ideas that are strengthening the fabric of our communities and our movements," said Kris Hermanns, Chief Executive Officer of Pride

Foundation. “At a time when more than 200 pieces of legislation targeting LGBTQ people have been introduced across the country and there is opposition to discrimination protections for transgender people, we need strong, life-affirming resources and services accessible to our community. That’s what these grants are all about.”

In addition to these community grants, Pride Foundation awarded a total of \$7.2 million to visionary organizations and student leaders in Alaska, Idaho, Montana, Oregon, and Washington in 2016 through our scholarship program, sponsorships, and our area of interest, donor-designated, and donor-advised funds.

Since the foundation began in 1985, Pride Foundation has awarded nearly \$72 million to promote the safety, health, and well-being of LGBTQ individuals and families across the Northwest region—with a focus on those who are most impacted by disparities and inequities.
